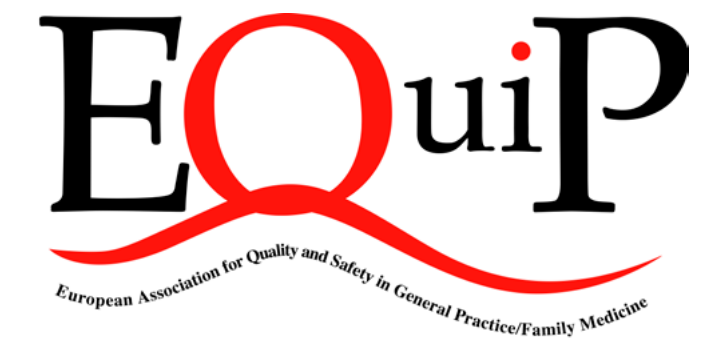


EQuIP Virtual Conference 2021: Introduction and Programme

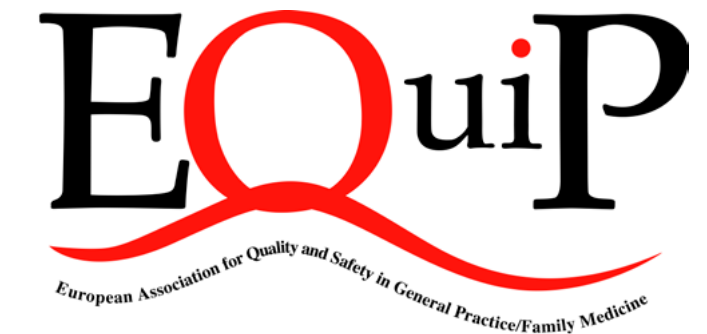

EQuIP Virtual Conference 2021: Keynote Chat Messages, 20 March

Erika Zelko : *Who pays the cost of the mediator or translator?*

Gunnar : *In Norway it is the community*

Hagit Dascal Weichhendler : *It may also be related to financial abuse. Isolated abuse or linked to forms of family violence. Do you think that documenting a code for poor literacy or social problem requires special permission from the patient?*

Andree Rochfort : *you make a very important point Hajit, doctors are often not aware of these situations in families, and sometimes it is the "carer" who is carrying out the financial abuse.*

Erika Zelko : *In Slovenia they have access to all specialist, but it takes a lot of administrative work to organize it by the GP.*

Toni Dedeu : *Does health literacy also include 'Digital Literacy'?*

Ulrik Bak Kirk : *Good point, Toni. Maybe it is coined as "Digital Health Literacy"?*

Toni Dedeu : *Some of the social demographics information can be collected in a multidisciplinary team approach (health care professionals and Social Workers) and the eHealth Records (EHR/EMR) ought to be at least shared and even better a single EHR where possible. There are such experiences in Europe.*

Mohammed Morad : *To be aware of the cons of digital health as it may increase disparities in health. The same for the hidden segment people with disabilities.*

Toni Dedeu : *'Digital divide' is a challenge for sure.*

Andree Rochfort : *Digital health can also help patients with low HL ... we can give a patient a link to further information and they can ask a person of their own choice in the family or community to access it and translate for them at a later point in time, for example information about chronic disease self management.*

Health literacy is a patient safety issue too...it can be an obstacle for patient adherence to medication, or lack of knowledge about reporting possible adverse reactions to medications....

Katrin Martinson : *The idea of digital translations "if needed" is brilliant.*

Toni Dedeu : *You are making a really good point Stéphanie. An induction process with key basic information to immigrant and refugees should be tackled at supranational level. The EU should make it mandatory, and non-EU countries at national level. So, what can Primary health care do?*

Mohammed Morad : *Networking of primary care with community organizations, not only national formal ones. The public health role of primary care.*

Hagit Dascal Weichhendler : *Yes, but there are a lot of barriers - legal etc regarding sharing information.*

Mohammed Morad : *Designing care to meet needs and expectations.*

Hagit Dascal Weichhendler : *I believe we need much more presence of social workers in the clinics working side to side with us as GPs.*

Toni Dedeu : *Absolutely Mohammed. But how to reach these people?*

This is a cross-sectoral approach and the role of PHC in intersectoral involvement.

Mohammed Morad : *Advocacy is very important in these cases.*

Verbal contact with the community. Profiling is very dangerous.

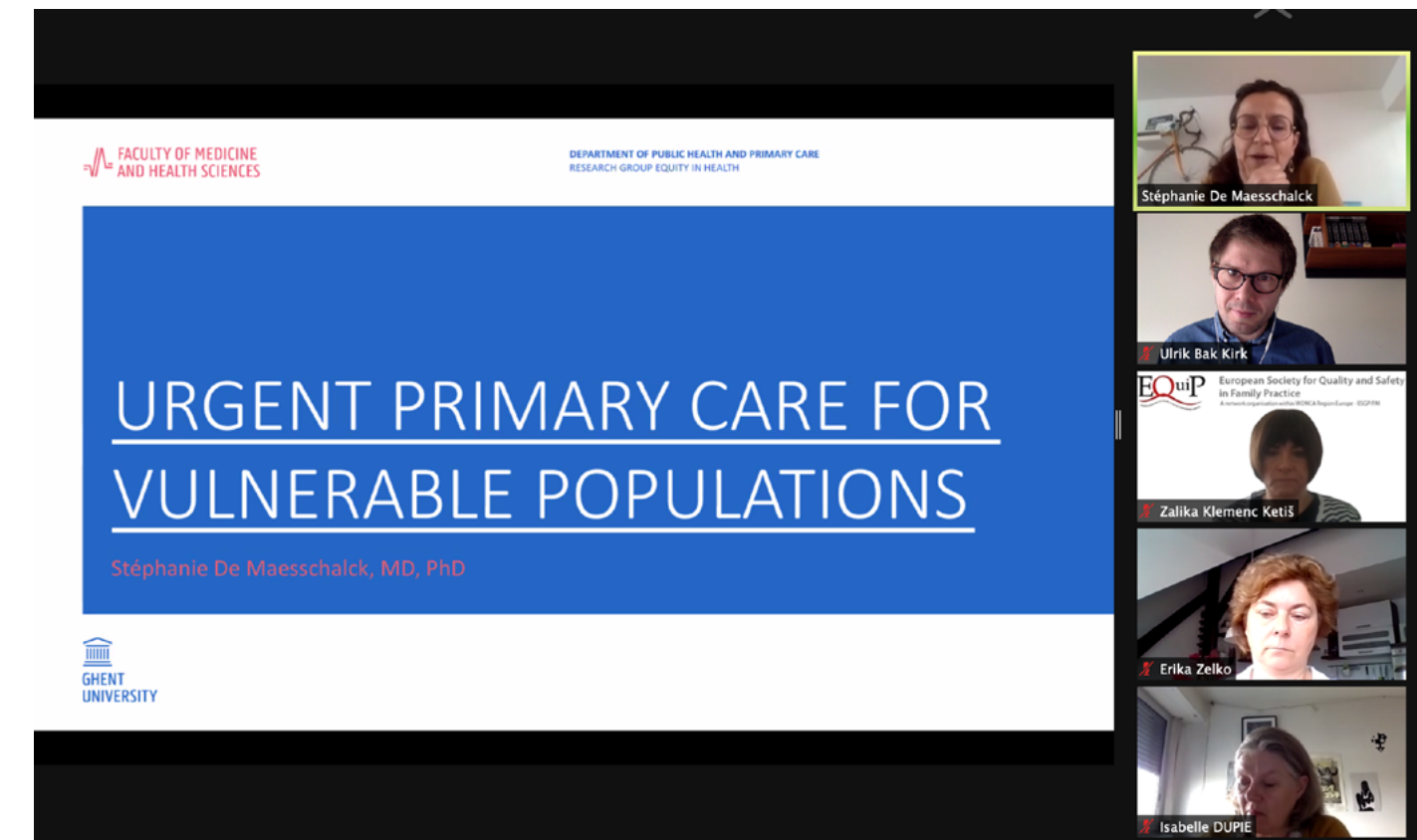
Toni Dedeu : *And expanding the Community perspective of Primary health and community care.*

This requires new skills for GPs in many countries.

Andree Rochfort : *And new knowledge about referral pathways for patients to appropriate health and social worker professionals in the community at the meso level.*

Toni Dedeu : *Can Stéphanie repeat the name of the guy who she is talking about?*

Piet Vanden Bussche : *Hans Verrept.*



Mohammed Morad : *Extraordinary lecture.*

Toni Dedeu : *Well done Stéphanie. An excellent presentation. Generated vivid reflexions in the chat. Congrats.*

Carmen Erkelens : *I made me reflect upon the importance of registration of patients' social situation.*

Jose-M Bueno : *In Europe we have very different health providing systems with very different funding.*

Dragos : *Thank you for your presentation ! I guess there are several challenges to tackle:*

- 1) The healthcare pathway differs largely by EU country. It can be very puzzling to a well educated foreigner and nearly impossible for migrants that don't have the language proficiency;*
- 2) Digital systems could actually help with triage and appointments as a lot of platforms are being developed. The exemple of such - doctolib in France - which can ease finding a free GP or specialist and also help with triage;*
- 3) Bureaucracy ease through digitalisation is another factor - easing some of the demands such as the first steps of healthcare protection for migrants that could be done online, directly from the GP office;*
- 4) The primary care network is vital - knowing available social workers or free of charge specialists is crucial;*
- 5) Before the interpreter or translator: Which platform is better for translation?*

I do use google translate in order to translate indications etc. Privacy is another question.

Toni Dedeu : *We have to move towards Universal Health Care - a cross-sectoral approach is the cornerstone.*

EQuIP Virtual Conference 2021: Concluding Chat Messages

Workshop: Emergency Primary Care in the EU: Let's Do It Better!

Rosario Falanga : *The problem to organize a good out of hours service: 1) Financial costs, and 2) We don't have many young GP to implement out of hours service 24/7. We need to share our patients summary digital clinic data with out of hours service e department of emergency care.*

Zalika Klemenc Ketiš : *In Slovenia, we organise out-of-hours care in primary health care centres and this system works well.*

Mohammed Morad : *In Israel, some OOH service is provided at the PCC but most at different locations. Funding could also be mixed in remote areas.*

Workshop: The Science Behind Triage and Decision Support in Primary Care

Toni Dedeu : *I learned about the evidence and scientific rigour in the workshop on triage.*

Mohammed Morad : *Today, some use bots and apps for triage and even some HMO's do that without providing the evidence in support of the use. We should warn of that issue. AI has to take in consideration the contextual issues; relying on its use without reservation would raise questions and doubts.*

Hagit Dascal Weichhendler : *Urgent care and triage during working hours - is also an important issue to be examined and discussed.*

Johanna Tulonen-Tapio : *Triage-session confirmed many ideas about it's sensitivity and spesificity and the ways nurses are using it. Interesting! We are having a webinar for nurses about triage .*

Mohammed Morad : *Some group practices offer extended services and cover some of the OOH time. We have limited nurse triage at the primary care clinics*

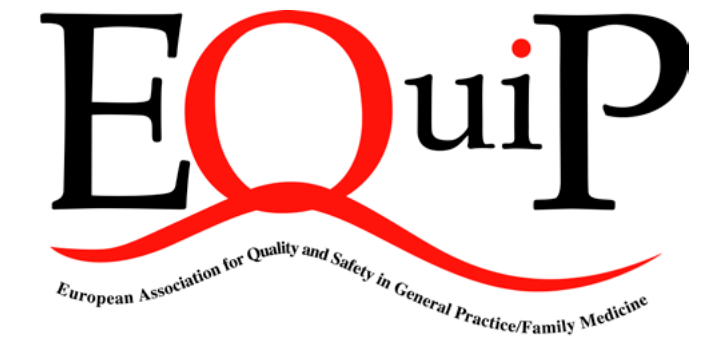

Emergency primary care in the EU: Let's do it better!

Paul Giesen (MD PhD) is GP in Nijmegen, the Netherlands. He was one of the initiators of the Dutch GP cooperatives for out-of-hours GP emergency care in 2000.

Since then he is project leader on research in GP emergency care and collaboration with ambulance and A&E department. His research group at IQ healthcare, Radboud university medical center (Nijmegen, the Netherlands) published more than 200 articles in scientific magazines.



Piet Vanden Bussche

GP in a group practice in Flanders Belgium.

Lecturer at Ghent University and member of the expert center Quality and Safety Ghent.

Senior GP for the Quality and Teaching Department of Domus Medica.

Past president and member of EQuIP Executive Board.



Aim

To give an overview of emergency primary care in the EU (current models, strong and weak aspects and desired future developments).

What is the current and wished role of GP in emergency care.

Reflect on the optimal emergency primary care: challenges and threats in the EU.

Abstract

In the EU there are many different organizational models for emergency primary care and there is a tendency towards large-scale primary care organizations in out-of-hours.

The main reasons for this tendency are the increasing workload, the low commitment of GPs, and their minimal financial support and number of personnel.

Another factor is the increasing shift of patients towards ambulance and hospital care. This is cost ineffective and undermines the role of the GP.

But are GP's motivated to for emergency care? What is their role and what are their wishes? Let's do it better, but what is the optimal model? What are the program requirements for optimal GP emergency care in Europe?

Marleen Smits and Carmen Erkelens: *The science behind triage and decision support in primary care*

Marleen Smits is an experienced researcher in the field of the quality and organisation of health care. Her PhD thesis was about patient safety in hospitals, while working at Nivel (Utrecht, the Netherlands) in 2005-2009.

Since 2010 Marleen works as a post doctoral researcher at IQ healthcare, Radboud university medical center (Nijmegen, the Netherlands).

She has performed many national and international studies on out-of-hours primary care, supervised 3 PhD students and is (co-) author of +60 peer-reviewed papers.

Marleen is board member of EurOOHnet and academic editor of PLOS ONE.



Carmen Erkelens (MD PhD) is a researcher in the fields of acute cardiovascular disease and quality and safety in primary care at the Department of General Practice of the Julius Center, University Medical Center Utrecht.

Last year she defended her PhD thesis which was titled 'Safe telephone triage of acute cardiovascular symptoms in out-of-hours primary care'.

She combined her PhD project with a Postgraduate Master of Epidemiology (specialization: clinical epidemiology) at Utrecht University. Currently she is completing her GP training.

She is both the Founder and Director of the hospice as well as Director of the health care center.



Take Home Messages

- Good quality of palliative care contributes to the feeling of security at home of the patient and prevents crises and increase the possibility for dying at home, which is the most desired patient wish.
- The organisation of how to address palliative care emergencies at first sight seems to be different internationally, but at a closer look there are many similarities in challenges.
- The good news is that every country has basic organisation/infrastructure to build upon. That gives the possibility for organising good and accessible palliative care for everyone.
- A shared experience is that if there are good palliative care services, it decreases the number of crises.
